MINUTES

SATURDAY, February 20, 2021

- 8:30 a.m. Darrell Crabbe, SWF Executive Director, welcomed the delegates and introduced Clark Schultz, SWF President
Opening Remarks / Welcome to the Delegates – Clark Schultz, President, SWF
One-minute silence in remembrance of SWF members & CAF who have passed away during the last year
- 8:35 a.m. **The Hon. Warren Kaeding, SK Minister of Environment**
- No invasive mussels found in SK - more work needs to be done. 2021 focus on watercraft inspections.
 - Habitat Management Plan – SWF important role. Added 70,000 acres to RAN – working towards 12% of SK land protected.
 - Trespass legislation – no start date yet.
 - Comprehensive review of the fisheries regulations.
 - Important to complete wildlife surveys – mandatory in 2021/22 season
 - Very appreciative of the relationship the Ministry has with the SWF
- 8:40 a.m.. Adoption of Minutes of 2020 Convention as circulated – Trent Empey / Todd Smith
- 8:45 a.m. **SWF Executive Director's Report – Darrell Crabbe**
- Pandemic causing a new reality. Sustain income / reduce costs. Habitat and Fisheries programs excelled in this environment, unfortunately our Education and NASP programs were affected.
 - Membership was down 1,000 members. On average we have 20% non-renewal. We must focus on this over the next year. We will be sending out some options that we hope that the branches will take in to consideration to get those members back.
- 8:55 a.m. **SWF Finances – Approval of the 2020 Audited Statements – Darrell Crabbe**
- Darrell presented an overview of the 2020 audited statements. Asked the members to read the auditor's notes attached to the statements. Thanked the branches, board and staff for their efforts over the year.
 - Motion to accept as circulated – David Yorke / Richard Petersen
- 9:10 a.m. **SWF Communications & Marketing – Chelsea Walters, Director**
- 2020 had a big focus on digital. Created numerous online programs. Website update. Launched Shopify store. With cancellation of in-person events, made the move to online membership. Appreciated everyone's patience with the zoom process. Released Brendon LaBatte series of videos/ran ad for the delegates. Check out our YouTube.
 - 2021 – membership drive – larger push. Online membership. Province-wide radio ads. Showed a video clip – Keep SK Wild. We will be doing additional membership pushes throughout the year.
 - Film Festival – documentary style films, encourage the members to sign up for these free films.
 - Zoom – will share our zoom accounts to the branches for their branch meetings – will assist with the process.
 - Offering to get ads set up and help the branches advertise locally. Branches responsible for paying for the ads, but we will help create the ads for free. Contact Chelsea.
- 9:20 a.m. **Habitat Trust Report – Darren Newberry, SWF Director of Habitat Lands**
- 2,320 acres acquired of which 1549 were donated. Received \$184,663.14 cash from 2 estate donations.
 - Antler program – sold over 3,000 lbs. of antlers last fall. Tax receipts can be issued.
 - Golf tournament – cancelled in 2020. Hopefully we will be able to have some sort of event on June 22/21 in Elbow.
 - Land Management – busy field season with inspections of land purchases and donations. Also if in the area, do random inspections of other HT parcels. Over \$270,000 in lease revenue for 2020.
 - Thanked the members and branches for all their support of Habitat Trust
- 9:40 a.m. **SWF Education / Hannin Creek Education & Applied Research Centre Reports – Shannon Anderson, Director**
- Conservation Camp was cancelled in 2020; 2021 – still unknown. Applications from last year will be put in for 2021
 - Women's Outdoor Weekend – postponed till May or September. Applications still live for 2021.
 - Youth Conservation Leadership – 15 -18 years of age – took it virtual. Started a speaker series – new video each week speaking to professionals in the conservation arena. Making great partnerships with other organizations.
 - Snowshoes –17-18 groups last year. Already this year over 28 with a waiting list. Purchased 50 new pairs last year. Hopefully will purchase a few more this year as some that need to be replaced.
 - With cancellations – new programs: Backyard biodiversity program – native wild flower seeds in conjunction with education program – importance of pollinators/wild flowers. Classrooms in a box – mammals, fish, birds. Developed fisheries coloring book for parents and kids. Partnered with Nature Regina developed videos – water quality and ice fishing. Seniors' home – bird ID pamphlet made. Classrooms on Ice/Marsh manuals revamped.

SWF Education / Hannin Creek Education & Applied Research Centre Reports (Cont.)

- Sporting Clay shoot scheduled for July 10 at Hanley Sporting Grounds – make \$7500+ for Education
- Over 200 entries for last year's fish artwork contest. This year will be run for the month of April for grades 4-6.
- New partnerships – Nature Regina, Global TV Morning, CTV Morning. How to Ice Fish video.
- Reprinted the Wonders of Wildlife manual with activities for children to adults.
- Hannin Creek – closed pretty much for 2020 – open for a couple of groups in the fall. All cancelled groups rebooked for 2021. Time to make repairs / improvements to the camp with the closures.

9:55 a.m.

National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) – Doug Gibson, Director

- Right after convention last year, provincial and national tournaments were cancelled. Bookings carried through as soon as restrictions lifted.
- Trainings for last year: 12 trainings / 120 people. Training different in each school division – created an online portion and a range time portion.
- National tournament - Regina for one more year. Have the option of a Western Canadian tournament (BC/AB/SK).
- Provincials – as usual, as soon as we can get in.
- Online portion of BAI training – 4 hours. Get in touch with Doug to line up range time, set up gym, coaching – minimizes contact. Teachers can work on it on an evening / weekend. There is a refresher course available.
- Working on new equipment supplier - partnered with Golden Archery in Pilot Butte.
- Thanked the branches/teachers - keep getting the kids out and shooting.

10:05 a.m.

SWF Fisheries Report – James Villeneuve, Director

- Busy year – revitalize current projects, organizing material and looking at new projects
- 30 projects in development / 8 going into production this year. Form has been redone, and makes organization and information gathering better.
- 156 existing projects will be reviewed. 52 were inspected this year with the help of Shannon and Doug.
- Dissolved oxygen tests at the end of March last year before Covid shut down travel. 13 / 18 were completed for the secondary test. 24 more scheduled for 2021 – decisions made with oversight of the Ministry. Lake assessments.
- Spawn camp was cancelled last year – optimistic for 2021. Decision made at a later date.
- Fish in Schools (FINS) program – as schools were closing, James/Chelsea set up a bunch of tanks in their living room and provided live streaming back to the teachers/students. Positive feedback. 6 new registrations this year. Some schools have decided to defer. 32 schools participating.
- Aquatic invasive species – extremely active on the task force. Made mussel models. Social media campaigns, magazine articles, signage, sampling on our own.
- Master Angler program – taken over the C/R awards from the Ministry. Developing an app available for Apple and android. Reviewed the app setup – option to submit entries / become a member. Fish identifier, maps, regulations, Prussian carp alert all available on the app.

10:15 a.m.

Q & A – Darrell Crabbe. Options to submit questions via zoom / zoom chat / email questions in – all questions will be answered and responses sent out to the branches.

- Todd Smith – any option to record tagged fish catches on the new app? Yes James has made note, if not in the first release, it will be put on the first update.

Henry Kelsey Big Game Records – Warren Howse, HK Chair

- Provincial awards were cancelled in 2020, when able, they will be held in Melville.
- Measuring workshops put on hold as well until Covid restrictions are lifted.
- New HK Records book out – includes all entries up to 2019 season - \$30 + shipping
- 2 entries from 2020 made the top 5 provincially – will be panel measured when restrictions lift.
- If Awards night cancelled again, awards will be mailed to winners.
- Asked everyone to encourage their family, friends and neighbors to buy their SWF memberships early in the year to be eligible for awards – many of the top entries are non-members.

10:50 a.m.

Firearms Legislation – Gil White, SWF Firearms Chair

- Battle surrounding Bill C71 continued – no progress made at the federal level, but letters and conference calls to various MLAs at the provincial level resulted in some commitment from SK Party, i.e. appointment of provincial CFO.
- Letters were sent to federal Minister Blair – no response.
- Partnership between SWF and CCFR was formed at the SWF Convention 2019, providing numerical support for the CCFR and a discounted non-insured member fee for SWF members.
- Attended an online injunction hearing on Jan 18, 2021 – court has reserved its decision but if won, individuals with newly prohibited firearms from the May 1st OIC will be able to use their firearms as before and no further action by the federal government can take place until the challenge trial is completed and ruled on.
- Next steps include a costly court challenge, upcoming election, donations, question.

Canadian Coalition for Firearms Rights (CCFR) – Tracey Wilson, VP, Public Relations

- Developed a SWF/CCFR membership
- Issued a collaborative statement, joint effort by over 150 groups, re firearm ban
- Thanked the SWF branches for their donations.
- CCFR filed federal court challenge – no hearing date yet. Also filed an injunction to stay the firearm ban – not successful.
- Integrity march in September in Ottawa - 5000 people – controlled message.
- Educational tv programming – produced Gun Ban Canada / Broken Trust, and upcoming Gun Ban Canada Exposed – 8 episodes – all available on You Tube.
- Spent \$250,000 on advertising. 64 full page ads across Canada. Over 100 interviews since the May 1 Gun Ban.
- C-21 was tabled – will be opposing that in every way possible .

Donations to SWF Programs / Parade of Cheques – Darren Newberry

Total Donations: \$1000 to Invasive Species, \$1800 to Conservation Camp, \$2,550 to HCEARC, \$3,550 to Education Programming, \$3,500 to Central Office, \$63,250 to Habitat Trust, for a total of \$75,650. Thanks to all the branches that still managed to donate to our programs, in spite of the cancellation of so many branch events in 2020.

11:20 a.m.

MoE Enforcement – Compliance & Field Services Branch

Marc Painchaud, Director, Meadow Lake Compliance Area

- April 24, 2020 restricted travel in Northern SK. Conservation Officers were responsible for enforcing those restrictions. 11,000 man hours spent from April to June and checkpoints were manned 24 hours/day.
- Over 2000 calls regarding bears. CO's responded to 9,700 occurrences in 2020
- SK experienced record numbers of residents enjoying provincial parks. Noted increase in angling and hunting activity across the province.
- Crime Watch Prevention Advisory Network – encouraged all members to sign up to assist the conservation officers. You can customize to your area only.
- Variety of enforcement tools – SWF has assisted the CO's with purchase of Controlled Wildlife Models and they are very appreciative – very effective.
- Laid more than 2,000 charges in 2020 and issued over 2,700 warnings. Public plays a key role in reporting/solving crimes.

Shawn Riabko - Operation Landowner Respect

- Since 2011 increased hunting pressure on E side of province, both from SK and MB for moose.
- Illegal activities include: hunting on private land without permission, hunting at night, waste of game, willful damage to crops.
- Since 2017 Preeceville, Wadena and Yorkton field offices received over 125 calls to TIPS line with many more calls to local COs, indicating the majority was occurring during September.
- Ministry initiated Operation Landowner Respect in fall of 2020. Brought in additional officers from across SK for September; also included Aircraft Assisted Night Patrols.
- All vehicles encountered were checked to ensure they were in compliance with the various provincial statutes. 229 vehicles were engaged in the target area and as a result 47 charges were laid and 22 written warnings issued.
- Landowners/residents were very thankful for the increased CO presence.
